Upon this discovery, the two young lovers confess their feelings for each other and vow to become husband and wife. Min Cheng and Jiehua Shi, master Kunqu artists, perform this 500-year old declaration of love that still resonates today.
2:30PM-4:00PM	<b>Ask the Sky and the Earth, an Oratorio Cantata for the Sent-down Youth</b> <b>A Panel Discussion with Wei Su, Thomas Duffy, Charles Lu, and Ping Zhang</b> <i>Room 203</i> Five decades ago, 17 million China's urban youth of middle- and high-school age torn from their families, streamed into the countryside to be "re-educated by the peasants" for many years. "Ask the Sky and the Earth" attempts to convey the spirit of this epoch and the sentiments of an entire generation. Yale Professor and Cantata Librettist Wei Su, Charles Lu, and Ping Zhang will tell their own experience, feelings and reflections of being sent-down 50 years ago; and will be joined by professor Thomas Duffy of Yale Music School to share the story of the creation of this powerful Oratorio Cantata.
